of reviewing resumes.

Trustees and I attended meetings at Town Hall with new First Selectman Josh Brooks to discuss the library facilities study, as well as meetings with Lothrop to review and discuss the balcony enclosure project. We are closing in on the deadline to initiate construction and began the process to request a grant extension so we have sufficient time to get approvals from the CT State Library, publish and review public bids, and award a contract for the project.

We hosted a private event for a local company's holiday dinner and I met with other groups to discuss future upcoming private rentals event at the library. I also attended the December FLAG meeting and holiday luncheon, worked with

Petrunti Woodworking to finalize the design of shelving in the archives room, attended a Yale SOM informational webinar, and attended the LION board meeting.

I worked with Sandweiss to address some issues that had been noted with storm damage on a few trees on property. I also worked with the Town to remove a large cracked branch that was overhanging a sidewalk.

Highlights from the Youth Services Department—November

We had a wonderful November filled with activities for all ages. One of the biggest hits was a program called For Goodness Snakes! led by an educator from the Meigs Point Nature Center. Participants discovered fascinating facts about reptiles—learning that they are cold-blooded, lay eggs, and have scales and tails. They also learned that many snakes are strong swimmers, use heightened senses to locate prey, and can open their jaws an impressive 180 degrees. Attendees examined a snake's skeleton and skin, and even met two live snakes: Latte the milk snake and Mr. No Tail the rat snake.

The learning continued as our homeschoolers explored the five senses this month. To learn more about their sense of touch, kids traced their hands and attached textured items, like foam, beads, and pom-poms, to each finger. They then labeled each finger with words to describe the different textures. To explore their sense of smell, kids took part in a blind scent test featuring lavender, vanilla, vinegar, and coffee, guessing each scent before the answer was revealed.

This month's Science Saturday was all about light and color. Participants refracted light through a prism, made rainbows using flashlights and CDs, and experimented with chromatography using Skittles. They also discovered how marker colors separate using coffee filters and pipettes

filled with water, and created symmetrical paintings by mixing primary colors then folding their paper in half, revealing new colors created by the combinations.

Kids enjoyed making shrinky dinks this month with Nicolette, coloring designs like turtles, ice cream cones, and donuts, and then watching their creations shrink in the toaster oven. The program was so popular that many have already requested a repeat! At November's Lego Club, creations included a soccer player, a wedding on the moon, and a secret hideout.

Teens enjoyed a pumpkin spice taste test this month. We sampled a wide variety of pumpkin-spice treats—from butter and cereals to hummus, donuts, whipped cream, and more! The clear winner was a classic pumpkin pie, while pumpkin spice hummus earned the lowest score. Our popular book boxes also returned just in time for Thanksgiving break! Teens filled out

forms about their reading and viewing interests, and received curated boxes packed with library books, stickers, fidget toys, snacks, and other goodies. We had 17 teens participate! We also ended the month with a Nintendo Switch tournament, where teens battled it out on Mario Kart and Super Smash Bros.

We continued doing outreach this month, visiting fifth graders at Walsh Intermediate and kindergarteners at Tisko Elementary. Nicolette also represented the Blackstone at Murphy School's Math and Literacy Night, helping kids make buttons using our button maker and sharing information about upcoming programs. As the days grow colder and darker, we invite you to warm up at the library—there's always something new to discover!

Highlights from the Reference Department—November

Our Reference librarians have been busy with a number of projects. Jordan is a co-chair of the New Librarians Roundtable - they discuss topics such as "How to Deal with Ideas Not Panning Out" and "The Creative Process at Work." They share the various ways that they brainstorm in their professional lives and try to cover a variety of topics for those new to the field to help build connections, inspire new ideas, and learn more about what various librarians do in their roles.

Jordan and Ryan attended the first Regional Roundtable for the Greater New Haven area, where they discussed different ways in which surrounding libraries can work together to serve their communities. They were able to meet both academic and public librarians and talk to them about the similarities and differences between their various workplac-

es. They are hoping to have more meetings in the future, potentially at different locations, so they can all visit area libraries in person.

Ryan and Amy finished adding author names to all of the fiction titles in the catalog. Amy continues to work with patrons at our Tech Tuesday sessions and has received very positive feedback, including comment such as "you were wonderful" and telling another patron "you're in good hands." She has taken over preparing our weekly community events email as well.

Gilligan continues to study ASL, creates monthly book displays and is working on our digital scrapbooking project. (Our Town Historian has identified photographs in the early 1900's newspaper scrapbooks that she believes warrant scanning for digital preservation.) Gilligan also created a Connecticut Shore Guide

which we will be including as part of our Digital Resources.

Jenny completed the Propagation Station, which can be found in the main lobby. Stephen helped by sanding down a wooden book cart and Lee did a beautiful job of painting it. Plant propagations are pieces, or cuttings, from plants that grow their own root systems and become new plants. Patrons are welcome to take a cutting home with them and we encourage donations of cuttings as well.
